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Analysing existing One Health Networks

- Objective to identify One Health Networks operating at the global or regional (Europe, Africa, Asia) level & analyse strengths/gaps in their functioning
- Methods systematic literature/internet search supplemented with expert interviews to comprehensively identify One Health Networks
- Analysis Extraction of data about each network using a standardised template.
 Identification of gaps.



Challenges

- One Health globally/regionally/nationally there are many organisations/networks with direct and indirect international policy and operational interest in animal, public and environmental health.
- ➤ Limited knowledge and lack of comparative evidence on how theoretical One Health principles can (and should) be operationalised in practice

Some ideas for strengthening collaboration among organisations

- Development of feasible, evidence informed strategies for establishing and operationalising Regional One Health networks that adequately reflect regional and local conditions
- > Regional One Health networks effectively and efficiently coordinated and collaborate with each other in:
 - Aligning and optimising roles and responsibilities international and national policy, private sectors and other stakeholders (e.g. academia, research, NGOs/Civil Societies, community)
 - Ensuring sustainability:
 - Solving policy, legal and financial aspects & contributing to Sustainable Development Goals
 - Minimising potential for miscommunication and resistance to change to allow for open and diverse combination of skills and resources
